There are all sorts of events happening in and around London during April, from exquisite furniture and crafts exhibitions, to top design shows, and even a window box workshop. By Barbara Chandler

Kew blooms

See the best of spring on free tours from Victoria Plaza at 12 noon every day this month, for up to 20 people. Kew's Tropical Nursery throws open its doors on Sunday 11 April from 11am to 5pm. See amazing tropical plants (some are now extinct in the wild), and get the lowdown on climate, propagation, pest control and more. Enter through White Peaks gate.

All families in West London love Climbers & Creepers at Kew. Now comes Treehouse Towers outdoor play area, where 300 kids can climb ladders, clamber across rope bridges and slide down three towers of different heights. Find giant swings, zip wires, scramble nets, slides and a mountaineering ramp for a challenging family day out (ideally for children between the ages of three and 11). And from 2 to 18 April children can also join free tree-themed workshops. Check the website for programmes.

A free Easter Egg Hunt is on Easter Sunday 4 April from 9.30am to 12.30pm. Friendly characters from Climbers & Creepers will dispense tokens for a Green & Black's Easter chocolate treat.

Artful craft

John Makepeace shaped a generation of British furniture makers with Parnham School (sadly now closed). Currently he is showing a striking and sculptural new dining table in ash at 21st Century Furniture II - The Arts & Crafts Legacy, open until 25 April 2010 at The Millinery Works

Also wonder at a further exquisite 69 pieces of furniture by 45 of the UK's leading designer makers. Martin Grierson's Falling Water is a cabinet in guarter-sawn brown oak, lined with cedar-of-Lebanon, with a front carved by Georgy Mkrtichian - undoubtedly a future antique from true masters.

Marc Fish's Le Orchidée desk updates Art Deco with a delicate yet robust aluminium base and tambour top. Supporting a trend for furniture eco-art is Ian Spencer's Bonifacio chair, made from multi-coloured wood off-cuts - as is Ed Johnson's Firestarter table. Tiptoe through the tulips at Waddesdon Manor

People love visiting the Waddesdon Manor most of all National Trust houses. It was built 130 years ago by Baron Ferdinand Rothschild - a great Victorian pile-up that looks like a French chateau landed in the Home Counties, just 40 miles from London.

Their stunning Tulip Festival is open now until the end of the month, from 10am to 5pm (you will need a gardens ticket) Admire two new tulip beds in front of the house with a dazzling array of special varieties - check the website for what's flowering when. Get to grips with history on a guided tours of the ground floor - Fridays 9, 16, 23 and 30 April 2010 at 11.30am, at £5, plus normal admission charges. Booking essential on 01296 653226.

And snap up a garden gem at the Spring Plant Fair at the Plant Centre on Saturday 24 and Sunday 25 April, from 10.30am to 4pm, admission free.

What's on at the V&A

Quilt-making got a radical new image when Tracey Emin took it up. Her work is just one of around 65 finely-crafted pieces in **Quilts** (some over 300 years old), a major new show open now until 4 July.

Horace Walpole and Strawberry Hill runs until 4 July. Walpole was a leading 18th-century English collector, but his treasures were auctioned off by his heir in 1842. This show reassembles around 250 of them, evoking the interiors of Strawberry Hill, Britain's finest example of Gothic revival architecture.

Decode: Digital Design Sensations continues in the Porter Gallery until 11 April, with an astounding selection of digital and interactive art and design by over 35 international artists, designers and studios. * The V&A Museum, Cromwell Road, South Kensington, SW7; www.vam.ac.uk/decode.
